

What is the Marijuana Policy Project?

With more than 26,000 members nationwide, MPP is the largest marijuana policy reform organization in the United States. MPP works to minimize the harm associated with marijuana — both the consumption of marijuana and the laws that are intended to prohibit such use. MPP believes that the greatest harm associated with marijuana is imprisonment. To this end, MPP focuses on removing criminal penalties for marijuana use, with a particular emphasis on making marijuana medically available to seriously ill people who have the approval of their doctors.

MPP has a track record of success. In 2008, MPP successfully passed a medical marijuana ballot initiative in Michigan and an initiative decriminalizing possession of small amounts of marijuana in Massachusetts, among other victories.

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
